GOODS	DOCUMENTS REQUIRED	CUSTOMS PRESCRIPTIONS	REMARKS
Removal Goods - Household Goods	<ul> <li>Original B/L or AWB or copy of telex/express release.</li> <li>Detailed inventory (sheet with the details of household goods to be mentioned as per new guidelines issued Sept 23rd 2017.</li> <li>Passport copy with Qatar work / residence permits.</li> <li>No-Objection letter to import HHG's into the country (typed in Arabic) on the original letterhead of employer / sponsor in Qatar signed by the authorised signatory of the company.</li> <li>First entry stamp to Qatar from the passport page or A Valid Qatar ID.</li> <li>Clearing Agency authorization to be done online before the vessel arrives Hamad. (Customer must have a local number registered under the QID to authorize on <a href="https://www.ecustoms.gov.qa/qccsw/jsf/common/eServiceLogin.jsf">https://www.ecustoms.gov.qa/qccsw/jsf/common/eServiceLogin.jsf</a></li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Customs is imposing duties on all import shipments (especially SEA import) with duties and taxes at 5% on customs declared value:</li> <li>The only exemption relates to personal baggage and gifts accompanied by the shipper at the following conditions:</li> <li>The value thereof may not exceed 3000 Qatari Riyal.</li> <li>Should be of personal nature and not of commercial quantities.</li> <li>The shipper cannot be a frequent passenger at the customs station.</li> <li>Customs reserves the right to take any decisions (as per Customs Article 21).</li> <li>All shipment imported to Qatar must be strictly palletized, otherwise several additional charges related to this will be charged to the customer from both the Customs Authority and the Qterminals</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Shipments to be declared as used household goods and personal effects.</li> <li>All shipments are subject to 100% physical inspection. Additional charges for customs Inspection will be invoiced based on the tariff.</li> <li>Computer equipment requires a separate clearance procedure through Qatar customs. If a computer is included in the shipment, specifications should be sent prior to arrival to obtain Qatar Telecommunication approval.</li> <li>Any forms of idols used for the purpose or worship or as a part of decorations must be declared and a prior approval must be taken from the Ministry of Endowments and Islamic Affairs to import such cargo.</li> <li>LCL shipments arriving POE Doha are taking up to two weeks in port to be deconsolidated. Therefore, Customs clearance and delivery after vessel arrival can take up to three weeks.</li> <li>No one is allowed to have access to the goods until Customs officials have completed clearance, leading to problems during re-packing.</li> <li>There are additional charges related to Inspection, non palletization penalty, labour charges for inspection etc, that will be billed as per the tariff issued by the relevant</li> </ul>



Diplomatic removal	<ul> <li>Original B/L or AWB or copy of telex/express release.</li> <li>Detailed inventory.</li> <li>Letter of protocol from the relevant Embassy must be processed with the Qatar Ministry of Foreign Affairs.</li> <li>Valid Qatar ID &amp; Passport</li> <li>Manual Authorization for clearing agency to be completed.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>MOFA letter from Embassy is required for duty / inspection exemption.</li> <li>Import of alcohol is allowed for diplomats but limited to annual quota agreed by the local Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the respective embassies in the country and it should be declared in the packing list and MOFA letter.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>All documents including the original MOFA approval document will be submitted to the Customs Authority for duty exemption.</li> <li>After the vessel arrives, irrespective of receiving the approval for duty exemption, it is at the discretion of the Customs officer if the goods require 100% inspection or not.</li> </ul>
New furniture	<ul><li>Legalised CIF invoice.</li><li>Certificate of origin.</li><li>Inventory.</li><li>Original B/L or AWB.</li></ul>	Duty: 5% on CIF value plus legalization charges.	<ul> <li>Invoice and C/O must be endorsed by the Qatar Embassy at origin and received by destination agent prior to shipment's arrival.</li> </ul>
Motor vehicles	<ul> <li>Original registration certificate.</li> <li>Original Vehicle Export certificate</li> <li>Vehicle details – on an excel format as per the standards.</li> <li>If imported by Carnet basis, original carnet is required for clearing the vehicle.</li> <li>Insurance policy.</li> <li>Invoice (if available).</li> <li>Original B/L or AWB</li> <li>NOC from the employer</li> <li>Qatar ID and Passport copies of the actual consignee</li> <li>Clearing Agency Authorization to be completed online before the vessel arrives. (Customer must have a local number registered under the QID to authorize on <a href="https://www.ecustoms.gov.qa/qccsw/jsf/common/eServiceLogin.jsf">https://www.ecustoms.gov.qa/qccsw/jsf/common/eServiceLogin.jsf</a></li> </ul>	<ul> <li>5% duty plus legalization charges on CIF value may be charged at the discretion of customs.</li> <li>For all vehicle(s) older than one year, a prealert, with all details included, is required seven to ten days in advance of vehicle(s) arrival.</li> <li>Cars older than 5 years are not allowed to be imported without prior approval from the Customs Authority, Metrology dept and the Ministry of Commerce and Industry.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>For registration: to be done by the owner and the relocation company cannot help with this process:</li> <li>Proof of ownership at origin and original import manifest are required. Owner must be resident in Qatar prior registration in her/his name.</li> <li>Possibility for a single shipper to import more than one vehicle.</li> <li>Import of vehicles older than five years is forbidden.</li> </ul>

Cats & dogs	<ul> <li>Health certificate dated no more than 2 weeks prior to date of arrival.</li> <li>Import licence issued in Qatar.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Following dogs require at least 2 weeks' notice and may be rejected:</li> <li>Boxers, Bulldogs, Rottweilers, Pugs, Great Danes, Dobermans, Shar Pei's and Japanese Akitas.</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Health certificate has to be issued by government approved veterinary clinics and faxed at least 3 days prior to arrival.</li> </ul>
Audio/video tapes, books, and CDs		Subject to screening by the Ministry of Information & Education.	<ul> <li>Returned within 14 working days.</li> <li>To import religious books a special approval must be taken from the Ministry of Education.</li> </ul>
Prohibited items		<ul> <li>Alcoholic beverages.</li> <li>Pork.</li> <li>Wireless transmitters / receivers.</li> <li>Firearms, explosives.</li> <li>Narcotics.</li> <li>Swords, daggers.</li> <li>Pornographic material.</li> <li>Items made from ivory.</li> <li>Buddha statues.</li> <li>Any products that have not been either: <ul> <li>Manufactured in Qatar in accordance with the law; or</li> <li>Illegally imported into Qatar.</li> </ul> </li> <li>Political and religious literature/articles deemed offensive to the Qatar government and the Islamic faith.</li> </ul>	All prohibited articles detained by Customs may be destroyed without consignee's consent.
